## Innovative Neurosurgery at CGS Hospital Restores Mobility



In a breakthrough for veterinary care, the Neurosurgery team led by Dr. Vikash Singh Chauhan, at CGS Hospital in Gurugram, successfully repaired a fractured cervical vertebra (C2) using screws and Polymethyl Methacrylate (PMMA).

Woody, a one-year-old Labrador, arrived at the Hospital after a road accident and was in a state of shock. After stabilising and undergoing diagnostic tests, he became alert but was unable to bear weight on his left forelimb and hindlimb. A CT scan revealed a C2 vertebral fracture with severe spinal cord

compression, along with a fracture, causing sharp pain in his neck.

Facing a high risk of permanent damage, the Team performed an advanced spinal fixation which was a success. Remarkably, the very next day, Woody began walking with only a slight limp in his left forelimb. His neck pain also seemed to have eased significantly.

Discharged after a few days, Woody is walking steadily, bringing immense relief and joy to his family.

Unfortunately, cancer is increasing in animals too, mainly due to ageing and weakened natural cellular protection.

Dogs, in particular, have become valuable models in comparative oncology, helping researchers understand cancer across species and develop treatments with translational benefits. Despite grim statistics where it is estimated that 1 in 4 dogs will be diagnosed with cancer in their lifetime, advances in diagnostics, surgery, chemotherapy, and targeted therapies have transformed cancer care.

At CGS Veterinary Care, our team is committed to providing compassionate care, advanced diagnostics, and personalised treatment options tailored to each patient and family. Routine preventive health checks play a crucial role in detecting cancer early, when treatment is most effective. Warning signs include non-healing skin lesions, gradual weight loss, and new lumps or bumps, which should never be ignored.

During a routine check-up, an enlarged lymph node was discovered and diagnosed as lymphoma, an aggressive cancer of the lymph nodes.
