

CGS Performs its First Tracheal Stent Surgery



At CGS Veterinary Care in Gurugram, each medical innovation brings us closer to a future where no small animal suffers from lack of care. The Hospital has achieved a significant milestone in veterinary care by performing its first tracheal stent placement surgery. This life-saving procedure provides a critical solution for those suffering from

severe respiratory issues and tracheal collapse. Such conditions can significantly impair their ability to breathe comfortably and stay active.

The case involved Noddy, an 8-year-old dog suffering from tracheal collapse and Brachycephalic Obstructive Airway Syndrome (BOAS). On arrival, Noddy was in critical condition and needed oxygen support. Following advanced diagnostics, the expert team led by Dr. Vikash, Deputy Director of CGS Veterinary Care, carried out the tracheal stent placement along with nasal and soft palate correction. Thanks to the minimally invasive approach and expert post-operative care, Noddy made a remarkable recovery, no longer requires oxygen, and is now leading an active life.

Skill-Building Training at CGS Hospital Strengthens Veterinary Excellence



CGS Hospital, Gurugram, recently organised two training workshops to enhance, both clinical skills and quality service standards.

The Basic Dentistry Training Programme, in collaboration with Innovative Veterinary Services and led by Prof. Dr. Adarsh Kumar, an expert in veterinary dentistry, combined theoretical and practical sessions in small animal dental care. Topics included oral anatomy, radiography, pathology, surgical extractions, and anaesthesia protocols, with live demonstrations.

The Veterinary Hospital Management Training, led by Dr Elli Kalemtzaki, chair of the World Small Animal Veterinary Association (WSAVA), provided staff with strategies to turn challenging interactions into opportunities for trust and loyalty.
