## Here are safety tips for pet parents and animal caregivers contributed by Dr. Mony Bora, Veterinarian at CGS Hospital

Choose age-appropriate toys: Opt for toys specifically designed for small animals. These are typically made from durable, non-toxic materials that are safer and more resistant to wear.

Avoid risky toy features: Steer clear of toys with small detachable parts, stuffing, or strings to avoid chewing and ingestion.

Supervise playtime: Supervise playtime especially when introducing new toys. Discard broken or damaged toys to prioritise safety.

**Training:** Training for pets can go a long way, especially introducing simple commands like "leave it" or "drop it" to prevent them from picking up or ingesting harmful objects.

Pluto, a three-month-old Golden Retriever, was brought to CGS with a complaint of vomiting. An abdominal ultrasound confirmed that there was something lodged in his intestines. Given the findings, an emergency exploratory abdominal surgery was planned. During the surgery, Pluto's intestines were plicated due to the presence of a foreign body, though fortunately, there was no rupture or perforation. Carefully, three socks were removed from his gastrointestinal tract. The procedure went off smoothly, and Pluto was shifted to intensive care for close monitoring. He started showing signs of improvement from the second day after surgery, including eating on his own. Over the next four days, he continued to recover steadily and is now doing great. He is back to being an active, playful puppy.
